The impact of the new roof went beyond practicality. With the leaks finally stopped, James felt inspired to make more improvements, turning his house back into a home.



"It's not raining in my hallway anymore," he said with a smile. "This roof wasn't just put on—it was built with love, faith, compassion, and helping thy neighbor. It was put on for all the right reasons. It spurred me to go further and do more."
